

Outstanding CPA in Government Awards: Preparing a Successful Nomination

Nominators often ask, "How can I improve my award nomination?" or "What is the secret to the preparation of a winning nomination?" Here are some that may help.

The preparation of a good nomination:

- Should not require lots of work, especially if you are familiar with the candidate and his/her achievements.
- A well written nomination should not be lengthy. The best ones are concise and clearly express the impact of the contributions of the nominee(s).
- The most time-consuming activity is to select people who will support the award with a letter of recommendation and the follow-up to remind these authors to submit their letters on schedule.
- Nominate a person who has made an important contribution to the field of interest covered by the award.
 - Review the list of [previous recipients](#) to obtain a benchmark for the quality of the contributions of these recipients.
 - Make sure that the contributions of your nominee(s) satisfy the description of the award. It is not unusual to read a nomination of a person who has done outstanding work, but the work does not satisfy the description of the award.

Members of the award selection committees typically have expertise in the field covered by the award. They may even know the nominee and his/her contributions. Put yourself in the position of a member of the selection committee and ask yourself the question, "What information would I need to judge this candidate?"

For the content of the write-up:

- Provide a specific, meaningful description of the candidate's contributions. Be specific. This specificity is the most important information you can provide in the nomination.
- Be specific in describing the *impact* of the contribution. The impact may include the economic or monetary value of services, influence on the work of others or social impact.
- Don't neglect to ask a colleague to do a critical review of your nomination.
- Ensure that your recommended citation is brief and contains a specific description of the candidate's contribution. It is important to make a good first impression.

Sometimes selecting people to write meaningful supporting letters can be the most challenging part of the preparation of a good nomination. Make sure that these people are familiar with the contributions of your candidate and that they support your nomination. Obtain supporting letters from people who have used the contribution of the candidate. Also, ask the authors of supporting letters to avoid just copying what you wrote in the nomination. The selection committee treats these letters very seriously and expects the author of the letter to provide his personal perspective on the specific contributions of the candidate.

Hopefully these guidelines provide a basis for submitting a meaningful nomination. It is a rewarding experience when your nominee receives an award.
